


Dr. David Vine

Dr. David Vine is Professor of political anthropology at American University in Washington, DC. Vine's newest book, *The United States of War: A Global History of America's Endless Conflicts, from Columbus to the Islamic State* (University of California Press), will be released October 13. *The United States of War* is the third in a trilogy of books about war and peace. The other books in the trilogy are *Island of Shame: The Secret History of the U.S. Military Base on Diego Garcia* (Princeton University Press, 2009) and *Base Nation: How U.S. Military Bases Abroad Harm America and the World* (Metropolitan/Henry Holt, 2015).

Vine's other writing has appeared in the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *Guardian*, *Politico*, *Mother Jones*, and the *Boston Globe*, among others. With the Network for Concerned Anthropologists, Vine has helped write and compile *The Counter-Counterinsurgency Manual or, Notes on Demilitarizing American Society* (Duke University Press, 2019) and *Militarization: A Reader* (Prickly Paradigm Press, 2009). Vine is a board member of the Costs of War Project and a co-founder of the Overseas Base Realignment and Closure Coalition. Vine is proud to have received his PhD and MA degrees from the City University of New York's Graduate Center.
